■ EVENTS HOSTED

REGIONAL CONNECT EVENTS

These networking events have provided business owners and managers the opportunity to engage with each other, discuss potential collaborations, speak to their local council, state or federal government representatives, ask questions, or share innovative ideas.

They are held monthly, with an average of 25-40 businesses attending each event.

Events are currently held in Goulburn and Jindabyne, with the intention to launch new Connect events in the Southern Highlands, Braidwood and Crookwell next financial year.

AG DAY 2019

139 people attended the 2019 Ag Day Gala Dinner to network, communicate and celebrate the contribution agriculture makes to our community. The menu on the night showcased local produce in a paddock to plate fashion and recognised the supply chain needed to provide such fare. Glenn McGrath, former Australian cricketer, was the guest speaker, with his talk focusing on his regional upbringing, career, personal highs and lows and connection with rural NSW. Via a silent auction and raffle, over \$5000 was raised for the McGrath Foundation.

Taralga farmer Andrew Connor said, "The event gave me the opportunity to get off-farm and enjoy a night out. The night was so enjoyable for me as I was able to catch up with a number of farmers that were friends with my father who I had not seen in years. My Dad passed away over 10 years ago so it was great to be able to have a chat to them about Dad and how farming has changed since then. Glenn McGrath was fantastic."

The event was a partnership between Goulburn-Mulwaree Council, Local Land Services, NSW Farmers, Goulburn Post, Tablelands & Monaro Farming Systems and DPI delivered the third Ag Day in Goulburn.

FIREAID 2020

Held in Bowral on 24 January, the FireAid 2020 event raised over \$350,000 for the local fire affected community. Over 6000 people attended the day and it ran without incident. We had the support of the local police, fire brigade and RFS and we procured local food and beverage suppliers in order to showcase their products to the audience. The show was incredible, and our team chose to work long hours on a voluntary basis at the actual event, a further display of our dedication to benefit the local community.

The money raised was distributed on EFTPOS cards linked to local Southern Highlands businesses to families who lost their homes during the bushfires. This approach, also helped to stimulate the local economy during a very challenging time.

CIRCULAR ECONOMY CONFERENCE

RDA Southern Inland (RDASI), Advanced Manufacturing Growth Centre (AMGC), Regional Development Australia ACT (RDA ACT) and the Canberra Region Joint Organisation (CRJO) hosted The Path to a Circular Economy forum in Goulburn on the 26th February 2020.

The event provided an introduction to recycling for the Circular Economy and how to maximise the use of valuable resources to contribute to innovation, growth and job creation.

Panellists shared examples of their innovative work in waste and the re-use of materials and how this has economic and social benefits. Professor Veena Sahajwalla, one of Australia's leading engineers, was the keynote speaker

EVENTS HOSTED

BUSINESS RECOVERY WORKSHOPS

RDASI assisted to organise and sponsor three Business Recovery Workshops in the region where business owners were invited to hear from all levels of Govt on funding and support which became available immediately after the Bushfire crisis in early 2020. Additionally, a professional marketing company provided insights and tips on how to develop a resilient social media presence.

At each of the three events, over 40 businesses attended. Council, ServiceNSW, TrainingNSW, RDASI & BCr8ive Media presented at each event. Businesses who registered (regardless of whether they attended) were provided the slides so they could refer to them frequently and pass them on to other contacts who may find them helpful.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

SISP PROGRAM 2019 & 2020

The SISP Program sees RDASI working closely with other RDAs, industry and schools to improve STEM future outcomes. In 2019, the number of schools increased to nine and transactional industry partnerships have increased from three to eight. As well as a heavy focus on the renewable energy sector, RDASI also partnered with engineering firms, education providers and an innovative waste management business, GoTerra.

502 students from Boorowa, Murrumburrah, Goulburn, Yass and Crookwell participated in SISP in 2019, an increase of 28% from 2018. Over 47 events were held throughout the year, including 41 separate industry interactions.

In 2020, 26 schools signed up to the program and we reached over 900 students, with 16 industry partners on board. We increased our scope from two to four regions – now including Upper Lachlan Learning Community, Goulburn-Mulwaree Learning Community, Southern Highlands Learning Community and Hilltops Learning Community.

Covid-19 restrictions meant that activities planned for Term 1 and 2 in 2020 were cancelled, with the program moving to an online format. Industry engagement sessions and STEM Challenge Days were hosted via zoom. Our industry partners were extremely accommodating and were able to engage and excite the students despite not being able to visit them in person.

When restrictions eased later in the year, a highlight was the Biala Blade viewing excursion hosted in Crookwell. Students from Crookwell High and Crookwell Public were treated to an up close and personal look at a 70m wind turbine blade. The blade was on its way from Port Kembla to BJCE Australia's Biala Wind Farm and stopped at the Crookwell Showground for students to admire.

REGIONAL MIGRATION PROGRAM

In the 2019-20 financial year, RDASI sponsored:

- 167 x 489 Visas
- 42 x 187 Visas
- 8 x 494 Visas

In total, RDASI assisted to bring 217 Skilled migrants into the region, filling roles that were unable to be recruited within the local workforce.

INVESTMENT SUPPORT

GRANTS OFFICER

RDASI employed a part-time grants officer to monitor, research and write grant applications for RDASI and external stakeholders. This role was fully funded by RDASI, with no cost to grant applicants.

The RDASI grants and research officer assisted 12 organisations to apply for over \$450,000 in funding within the Southern Inland region over a three-month period. When surveyed at the end of the process a

majority of applicants responded they were satisfied and would use our service again.

Unfortunately, due to Covid-19 financial restrictions RDASI was unable to continue funding this role. However, if feasible, we will reinstate the role in the new year, to continue assisting businesses with funding opportunities in the future.

CASE STUDIES

SOUTHERN INLAND AG DAY GALA DINNER 2019

National Ag Day is recognised on the 21st of November each year and brings awareness to the importance of Australia's farmers and our agricultural sector. For the past 3 years, RDA Southern Inland has organised Ag Day celebrations in Goulburn. On the 20th November 2019, RDA Southern Inland, with support from various sponsors, organised the Southern Inland Ag Day Gala Dinner in Goulburn to celebrate local farmers and agricultural businesses residing in the Southern Inland region. The Dinner provided farmers with an opportunity to come together, network and relax with a night away from the farm.

This event was a true example of local collaboration amongst local businesses, not-for-profits and government agencies. Sponsors and partners for the night included NSW Farmers, Coordinare, Department of Primary Industries, Tablelands Farming Systems, Divalls Bulk Haulage, Southern Region Business Enterprise Centre, Agnew Building Supplies, Local Land Services and the Goulburn Post. A number of these organisations also contributed on the organising committee and assisted in the lead-up to the event.

Our special guest speaker was former Australian fast-bowler and President of the McGrath Foundation, Glenn McGrath. The Southern Inland Agriculture Gala Dinner celebrated farmers' overall contribution to agriculture and the community, and the resilience they have shown over the past 12 months. Glenn McGrath's speech largely focused on resilience –throughout his adolescence, cricket career and family life. Glenn also found time in the afternoon to host a cricket clinic with up-and-coming young local cricketers before the gala event.

For dinner, guests enjoyed their delicious 3 course meal, highlighting the local Marianvale Blue – Australian Murray Cod, Dewsburys Pork Belly, Windellema Asparagus and Parkesbourne berries. A key focus was providing guests a paddock to plate style dinner showcasing predominately local produce.

A raffle was held to raise funds for the McGrath Foundation, with the main prize being 2 tickets to the Pink Cricket Test in Sydney and a night accommodation, sponsored by Tablelands Farming Systems. A cricket

bat signed by the 2018 Prime Minister's XI was also auctioned off with a purchase price of \$2,300. In total, over \$5000 was donated to the McGrath Foundation, including a portion of the dinner ticket price.

139 people attended the dinner from across the region. Feedback from the evening was extremely positive.

Results of a mobile survey taken at the event found:

- 100% of respondents enjoyed the evening and felt they got value from the ticket price
- 86% of respondents would like to see the event remain as a formal style dinner, as opposed to an informal BBQ (as per previous years)

This event is becoming well known throughout the local community, now being in its third year. This longevity contributed to the success of the event, as well as being able to capitalise on the National Ag Day initiative.







CASE STUDIES

SISP IN 2019

The STEM Industry Schools Partnership Program (SISP) Program has been running in the Southern Inland region since 2018, when the Southern Inland was selected as one of three regions to pilot the program. In 2018, Regional Development Australia – Southern Inland (RDASI) developed partnerships with Crookwell High School and its five feeder schools, as well as three local wind farms. In 2019, the number of schools increased to nine and transactional industry partnerships have increased from three to eight. As well as a heavy focus on the renewable energy sector, RDASI also partnered with engineering firms, education providers and an innovative waste management business, GoTerra.

502 students from Boorowa, Murrumburrah, Goulburn, Yass and Crookwell participated in SISP in 2019, an increase of 28% from 2018. Over 47 events were held throughout the year, including 41 separate industry interactions.

The Southern Inland SISP Program was built around a long-term school project, where all participating students worked in groups to design and build a product that enhanced the use of renewable energy. Ideas ranged from a solar powered dairy farm, a wind and solar powered house and a gas-free solar BBQ. Throughout this project, industry partners mentored and assisted students with their projects, as well as hosted students on site. This approach to SISP meant that students worked on the one problem and project for over 2 terms on a regular, weekly basis. This allowed students to build their confidence and ability in the 4 Cs and future focused enterprise skills. Industry partners visited the same schools on numerous occasions meaning rapport and relationships were built, rather than just the hosting of one-off events.


Prior to the SISP Program, 59% of students felt confident in their abilities in Maths, Science or Technology. This increased to 69% at the conclusion of the program.

Numerous successful events were also held, including the University of Newcastle's SMART Science Shows and Discovery Days, Central Queensland University's Ag-Tech workshops and workshops run by the Canberra Institute of Technology.

The inaugural Southern Inland SISP STEM Awards were held in Goulburn on the 4th December, with over 100 students, teachers, industry partners and special guests attending. This was a fantastic way to conclude SISP for 2019 and to recognise the STEM work that has occurred across schools in the Southern Inland region in 2019.









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
